I CORINTHIANS 11. 23-26

CELEBRATING COMMUNION



What does Communion mean to you? Is it an essential part of your Christian worship? Do you miss it when you do not have it? Has it become so familiar to you that it is no longer special?

Communion literally means "together as one" and shares its roots with the word "community". We use different names to describe it: breaking bread, the Lord's Supper (a continuation of the Last Supper), Mass (actually a nickname drawn from the last words of the Roman Catholic Communion service in Latin)

or the Eucharist (Greek word for "Thanksgiving"). All these different names add something to our understanding. At Communion, we come together as one with those who are gathered in church, recognise that we are one with the world-wide church and one with God. We break bread as Jesus did at the Last Supper and share the bread and wine to remember the sacrifice of Jesus, who gave his body and blood for us on the cross. So of course, this should lead to thanksgiving.

Communion began as an oral tradition, initially shared in homes, with its clear central symbolic elements of bread and wine. The first words written down about Communion are not in the Gospels but are in 1 Corinthians 11. 17-34 as Paul gives instructions to a new church as to how Communion should be conducted. He reminds them of what he has received (v23-25). It is not a meal to feast on, but symbolic food to share. It is about unity and fairness. They are to wait for one another and to examine themselves before taking it (v.28). This is why Confession is a part of the service as we get right with God. The Peace is getting right with one another. But maybe before we come to church or receive Communion, we all need to stop, examine ourselves, get right with others and God? This is a good spiritual discipline on any Sunday before coming to church, but perhaps even more so when it comes to Communion.

There have been shifts in Church of England practise of Communion. Many of us would have grown up with Morning Prayer being the main service and Communion a rarer, special service. Then there was a move to have Communion at every main morning service, perhaps to be more like the Roman Catholics, but also to emphasize the central importance of the

symbolic meal. With a reduction in ordained priests, there is now a move back to Morning Prayer as the main service. And Covid caused us to think about the practicalities of offering the bread and wine afresh.

There is an expectation that people should be confirmed as Anglicans before receiving Communion. I am of the view that this is the Lord's table and if people want to come, they should. At the Communion table, we meet with the risen Lord Jesus and feed on him in a deep and profound way as we proclaim his death until he comes again (v.26).

Our Giving to Mission Partners– following a request at last year's APCM, this was reviewed but we failed to communicate back to the whole church. **A** mission partners (getting roughly £1900 each in 2025) was reduced to 4 - CMS, IEM, Tear Fund and The Falconer Trust. The number of **B** mission partners (receiving £1000 each in 2025) remains at 4 - Barnabus, The Message Trust, Burnage Foodbank and Open Doors, We no longer support Dignity or Boaz Trust. The January PCC meeting will review the amounts allocated to A & B in light of the amount available to be allocated based on the previous year's income. This will ensure the levels allocated to A & B mission partners is kept under annual review.
