

ACTS 4: 23 -27

Boldness and Generosity



Last week, Matt preached on a very long passage (Acts 3:1 – 4:22) and made it easier, for himself and us, by dividing it into sections. This week, our passage is much shorter and divides, very clearly, into two parts. The first (verses 23-31) focuses on Christian boldness and the second (verses 32-37) on Christian generosity. We do need, however, to look back at last week's passage and remind ourselves

of the background to today's passage.

Firstly, the apostles Peter and John, were in Jerusalem and Peter's prayer led to the miraculous healing of a lame beggar (Acts 3:1-10). The man leapt for joy and a crowd gathered. Secondly Peter preached to the crowd (Acts 3:11-26), focusing on Jesus' death and resurrection, Jesus' (not Peter's) healing of the lame man, and how the crowd needed to respond and come to faith. Finally Peter and John are arrested and imprisoned, because of their preaching about the resurrection. The next day (Acts 4:1-22) Peter and John are brought before the Sanhedrin and questioned about their actions and preaching. Peter responds boldly and ends by proclaiming "Judge for yourselves whether it is right in God's sight to obey you rather than God. For we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard". After further threats, the two apostles are released and today's passage begins with them reporting back to the other believers.

The first section (verses 23-31) focuses on their bold response, and particularly their boldness in prayer. We might have expected a desperate prayer, based on fear rather than boldness. We might have expected the prayer to begin with a cry for help but it doesn't. It begins (verse 24) with a focus on how great God is, and a quotation from Psalm 2 (verses 25 & 26) where David faced opposition from national leaders of his day. Finally, in verse 29, they make their specific request to God.

Are you reminded here, as I am, of different kinds of prayer.

Firstly, think of **ACTS** (Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving and finally Supplication). Secondly, and especially for children, we have teaspoon prayer (**TSP**): thanks, sorry and please.

In his commentary on Acts 1-12, Tom Wright summarises their request as "Now, Lord, look on their threats, let us go on speaking boldly; and will you please continue to work powerfully."

How bold was that? What would our prayer have been, and what can we learn from this? Can the Holy Spirit embolden, equip and empower us in 2025?

Secondly, we have a section about generosity (verses 32-37) and the way that the early Church lived. This is similar to an earlier passage (Acts 2:42-47, particularly verses 44 and 45). There is an emphasis on sharing and giving to the needy. As we focus on generosity, are there lessons we can learn both individually, and as a Church? How can we apply these lessons in 2025?
