NICENE CREED



We believe science has all the answers. We believe in aliens from other planets. We believe in ourselves and our ability to solve all our own problems. People believe in all sorts of things, but what do Christians believe?

In our church worship we use Creeds (from the Latin 'Credo' which means 'I believe') and affirmations of faith. The Creeds are historic formularies (a collection of agreed words). They were formed by great church councils which took place from the first century

onwards. For example, the Apostles' Creed evolved from early second century baptismal confessions. The church was battling many different heresies; some denying the divinity of Jesus, some about how our bodies do not matter, only our spirits, and many around the Trinity: how can One God be three persons?

So the great church councils met to argue (and sometimes physically fights broke out) through these issues and come up with set words to clarify what Christians believe. One of these councils met in Nicaea (now Iznik in Turkey) in 325 A.D. From this meeting, the Nicene Creed was formulated (although it was revised several times until it was fixed in 381 A.D.). This means that, in the year we celebrate our 150th anniversary, this Creed is 1700 years old. So we thought it would be good to look at the Nicene Creed up to near Christmas and at what it teaches us.

Our first lesson is that this Creed does not begin "I believe". It is our belief as a Church: shared, preserved and cherished. When one of us is wrestling with doubts or is going through a tough time, the Church (God's children) still believes.

Then it goes on to state categorically that there is ONE God. The early church developed in a time when surrounding cultures had many gods. This One God is revealed to us as three persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. However, we hold in tension, celebrate and worship the mystery that is the Trinity.

Having One God reminds us that there are no others. He is the only One. His name is holy. We should worship no other gods. In our world today, where we do not experience people actively worshipping idols, it is easy to think that this is not a problem for us. But an idol is anything that distracts us from worshipping the One True God. It could be money, fame, family, self-reliance, a hobby, food, a football team, or anything that can become more important to us than the One God.

Next in the Nicene Creed, we are taken to the One God being our Father and Almighty. This shows us relationship and power, intimacy and awe, belonging and security. We wonder at how the God of all might can also be our "Daddy". This should lead to praise and worship.

So as we embark on this journey through the Nicene Creed, let us grow in our understanding of the One God in whom we believe, and let us examine ourselves to see if anything has become an 'idol' to us, preventing us from worshipping God alone.
